

AI-04643 Efficient Sprinkler Heads in 2026

Sprinkler Head question. I have a standand front yard, tell me what nozzles to upgrade using modern nozzle designs, mine was in 2000. Also, specify the sizes of nozzles, spray patterns etc. I have a long sidewalk strip around 1.5 ft, what is needed for this. Specify brand and model to use from Home Depot. I just need the nozzle replacement for effecient watering.

Your 1.5-ft-wide sidewalk strip

This matters considerably with MP Rotators. Hunter specifies approximately **40 PSI** for maximum performance; the Pro-Spray PRS30 body can be used when pressure regulation to 30 PSI is desired. ([Hunter Industries](#))

If your 2000-era system has **high water pressure**, I would strongly consider eventually upgrading the spray bodies to **Hunter Pro-Spray PRS30 pressure-regulated bodies**. But since you specifically want **nozzle replacement only**, I'd start with the nozzles and see how the system performs.
